**THE DOCK BOOKSHOP IN DALLAS, TEXAS HOSTS A DIALOGUE ON
THE EPIC FILM ABOUT 400 YEARS OF BLACK HISTORY**

***“The Czar of Black Hollywood” film director Bayer Mack will discuss
the January 29 release of the upcoming independent documentary
BLACK SEEDS: THE HISTORY OF AFRICANS IN AMERICA***

MEDINA, OH – Award-winning documentary filmmaker, Bayer Mack, will appear on the “Dock Power Hour” radio show on February 8, 2021 at 7:00pm (Central Time) to discuss his new independent documentary BLACK SEEDS: THE HISTORY OF AFRICANS IN AMERICA.

BLACK SEEDS will have its world premiere at the 2021 Denton Black Film Festival, www.DentonBFF.com, on January 27th. The powerful 70-minute film uses dramatic historical reenactments, rare period illustrations, and an original music score to explain the socioeconomic reasons behind the transatlantic slave trade and the development of chattel slavery in America.

Mack will also discuss the book "Black History 1619-2019: An Illustrated and Documented African-American History," which inspired the film, during his appearance on the program that will be presented by The Dock Bookshop in Dallas, Texas.
